



2021-2022 Call for Sex Therapy Workshop Proposals
Intersecting Identities

Council for Relationships (CFR) offers continuing education (CE) workshops throughout the year for mental health professionals including psychologists, counselors, social workers, marriage and family therapists, sex therapists, clergy, and more. **We are an approved American Association of Sexuality Educators, Counselors, and Therapists (AASECT) CE provider and approved by the American Psychological Association (APA) to sponsor continuing education for psychologists and other mental health professionals.**

The 2021-2022 Sex Therapy Lecture Series will reflect a clinical understanding of how sexual, gender, and relational identities are fluid and socially constructed according to time, context, and circumstance. These identities may inform, detract, obstruct, or become catalysts for healthy sexual relationships. Proposals should indicate appropriate clinical modalities and interventions used by sexuality or relationship therapists. Workshops should focus on clinical application through a systemic lens, with an emphasis on working with clients who present with diverse identities.

For the upcoming academic year, the Sex Therapy Program at CFR is seeking 6 innovative workshops in the field of sex therapy and consultation. Each workshop should be 3 hours (3 CEs). Presenters will be offered a modest stipend for their contribution to our intellectual and clinical growth. All presentations will be offered via Zoom, and in-person as the pandemic response evolves. We welcome proposals from outside the Philadelphia region.

A list of potential topics for your presentation are listed below:

- Sex therapy and consultation
- Sex trafficking, sex tourism, sex work (e.g., prostitution, erotic entertainment), sexual harassment, and the hegemonic politics that enable these institutions and behaviors
- HIV/AIDS/STI prevention, interventions, and attempts to reduce transmission
- Masculinity/Femininity, sex role adoption, and the possibility of transcending binary discourse
- Consensual non-monogamy or polyamory
- Sexuality language
- Reproductive politics
- Fantasy, desire, and the continuum of sexual arousal
- Aesthetics and body politics
- Human development, including the dynamics of aging
- Media (television, radio, internet) interpretations of sexuality
- Cyber pornography, cyber dating, cyber stalking/bullying, cyber rape, and victimization
- LGBTQAI issues
- Sex addiction or out of control sexual behavior
- Impact and role of the church on sexuality
- Feminism and womanism
- Communication
- Contraceptive technology
- Kink, BDSM, fetish, paraphilias, and polyamory
- The development of emotional intelligence
- Sexual globalization
- Sexual scripts, intimacy negotiation, and styles of courtship
